Dr. Tabbye Chavous is the Vice Provost for Equity & Inclusion and Chief Diversity Officer at the University of Michigan. She is also a professor of education and professor of psychology.

Dr. Chavous has held leadership roles at the department, college, and central administration levels during her almost 24 years at U-M. Most recently, she was the director of the National Center for Institutional Diversity and associate

dean for diversity, equity, and inclusion in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. Prior to that, Dr. Chavous served as an associate vice president for research, associate dean for academic programs and initiatives in the Rackham Graduate School, and chair of the Combined Program in Education and Psychology. Across all of her roles, the values of diversity, equity, and inclusion have been central to her leadership approaches and practices and infused throughout the initiatives, programs, and practices she helped develop and implement.

Keynote Speaker



Ms. Frances Kai-Hwa Wang 王凱華

PBS NewsHour Communities Correspondent U-M Dept of American Culture Program in Asian/ Pacific Islander American Studies Lecturer

Frances Kai-Hwa Wang is a journalist, essayist, scholar, and poet, focused on issues of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, race, justice, and the arts. The child of immigrants, she was born in Los Angeles, raised in Silicon Valley, and now divides her time between Michigan and Hawai'i. She is a Communities Correspondent for PBS NewsHour, and her writing has also appeared at NBC AsianAmerica, PRI GlobalNation, AngryAsianMan, Cha Asian Literary Journal, and more. She taught Asian/ Pacific Islander American Studies at University of Michigan. She cocreated a multimedia artwork for Smithsonian Asian Pacific American Center. She wrote three chapbooks and a book of prose poetry, "You Cannot Resist Me When My Hair Is in Braids." In Chinese School, she was often scolded for having the best spoken Chinese in class and the worst written Chinese.

Performance Piece: Dunhuang

Qingyun Chinese Music Ensemble at U of M

Qingyun Chinese Music Ensemble at U of M was founded in 2019, and they are the first and only Chinese music ensemble under U-M. Qingyun is established for the purpose of providing opportunities for performance experience and allowing students with previous experience in Chinese traditional instruments to continue their passion. They are determined to bring Chinese traditional music to the University of Michigan and therefore promote cultural and musical diversity on campus. The music piece performed today is Dunhuang. Dunhuang, an ancient city located on the Silk Road in China, holds significant cultural and historical importance, serving as a meeting point where diverse cultures, beliefs, and artistic expressions converged along the Silk Road, resulting in a rich tapestry of human experiences and interactions. Qingyun shares, "Through our music, we invite our audience to embark on a journey of discovery and illumination, where each note and melody shines a light on the timeless beauty of Dunhuang's cultural heritage."

Qingyun's Instruments

Chinese musical instruments encompass a rich diversity of sounds and traditions, reflecting the country's long history and cultural heritage.

Yangqin - A traditional Chinese hammered dulcimer consisting of a set of tuned metal strings stretched over a trapezoidal wooden frame.

Guzheng - A plucked zither with movable bridges, the Guzheng has a long history in Chinese music.

Erhu - Often referred to as the Chinese violin, the Erhu is a two-stringed bowed instrument with a characteristic soulful sound.

Pipa - A pear-shaped lute with a fretted neck, the Pipa has a bright, crisp sound and a rich repertoire spanning centuries.

Zhongruan - A four-stringed lute with a round body and fretted neck that produces warm, mellow tones.

Bamboo Flute - Crafted from bamboo, the Chinese bamboo flute (Dizi) has a hauntingly beautiful sound characterized by its airy, ethereal quality.

Percussion - Consists of a wide range of instruments such as drums, cymbals, and gongs provide rhythmic accompaniment and dynamic contrast.

Gifting of a Lei

Crafted with care, a lei is made with deep intention. Lei can be made with a variety of materials, but regardless of the medium, the lei maker takes the utmost care in choosing the color, design, and presentation. The gifting of lei is a shared practice across the Pacific and carries cultural meaning in every island nation. Lei are exchanged as symbols of friendship, honor, to greet, and show love. In Pacific Islander communities, lei are often bestowed to graduates to recognize their hard work and accomplishments. We hope you receive this lei with all the care and celebration that went into crafting and gifting it. Given that the lei holds such cultural meaning, we ask at the time of disposal, you do so honorably and respectfully with the environment and our values in mind.

Land and Labor Acknowledgment

The University of Michigan is located on the territory of the Anishinaabeg people. The Ann Arbor campus resides on land ceded through the Treaty of Detroit in 1807. Additionally, in 1817, the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Bodewadami Nations made the largest single land transfer to the University of Michigan, ceded through the Treaty of Fort Meigs, with the agreement that their children would be educated in perpetuity.

We assert the sovereignty of tribal lands and acknowledge the painful historical and ongoing genocide, forced assimilation, and displacement of Native communities in establishing the university.

We affirm contemporary and ancestral Anishinaabeg ties to this land, the profound contributions of Native American peoples to this institution, and the University's commitment to educating the children of Native ancestors.

We further recognize that whether you are on campus in Ann Arbor or elsewhere in the United States, we stand on land developed at the often-fatal expense of forcefully enslaved Black people. We acknowledge that much of this country, including its culture, economic growth, and development has been made possible by the labor of enslaved Africans and their descendants who suffered the horror of the transatlantic trafficking, chattel slavery, and dehumanization through segregation and Jim Crow laws.

We remember those who did not survive the Middle Passage, those who were beaten and lynched, and those who are still suffering while fighting for their freedom. We are indebted to their labor and unwilling sacrifice, and acknowledge the violence throughout the generations and the resulting impact and generational trauma still felt today.

The fights against settler colonialism and anti-blackness will always be inextricably linked. To the land, to the collective, and to the ancestors, we thank you, we thank you, we thank you.

History of the Celebration

The Asian & Pacific Islander Graduation Celebration was first held in April 2018. The celebration is key in bringing together several communities, both made up of different ethnic and cultural identities and from across student-staff-faculty areas of the University of Michigan campus. The celebration brings together families and friends.

We, the University of Michigan Asian and Pacific Islander Student Committee, plan this annual celebration to honor students of Asian and Pacific Islander heritage here at the University of Michigan.

Graduation Celebration Mission

The Asian & Pacific Islander Graduation Celebration celebrates the commonalities and differences that characterize the experiences of Asian and Pacific Islander students, as well as other students at the University of Michigan and serves as an example of the University of Michigan's commitment to diversity.

The ceremony acknowledges the value and uniqueness of the Asian and Pacific Islander student experience and serves to commemorate the accomplishments of those students that participate in the celebration. The celebration recognizes faculty and staff who provide academic enrichments, research opportunities, programs, and activities that promote the communal striving and sense of accountability that help students to achieve.

The Office of Academic Multicultural Initiatives (OAMI), in partnership with the Asian & Pacific Islander Graduation Celebration Planning Committee, institutes this annual celebration as an expression and tradition of valuing the University's cultural offerings and commitment to diversity.
