Dr. Katrina Wade-Golden is the Deputy Chief Diversity Officer for the Office of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (ODEI) and Director of Implementation for the Campuswide Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Strategic Plan. She brings over 25 years of administrative and research experience working with complex longitudinal datasets and has broad expertise leading research and strategy engagements in the corporate, higher education, and non-profit sectors, utilizing a wide range of qualitative and quantitative techniques. Dr. Wade-Golden possesses particular expertise in the areas of measurement, questionnaire design, social psychology, organizational dynamics, institutional diversity, and complex data analyses.

Her research interests are in the areas of organizational behavior and management, strategic planning, leadership development, change management, the impact of diversity and affirmative action on organizations, conflict resolution, stress, and work-family conflict.

Chyrisha Rucker is currently a third year medical student at The American University of the Caribbean School of Medicine. She earned a Bachelor of Arts in Women's Studies at the University of Michigan and a Masters of Business in Healthcare Administration at Cornerstone University.

She is a founding member of First Gens @ Michigan. The idea's inception occured during a one-on-one meeting with Greg Merritt. That day transformed her thinking of what it meant to be first-gen. In 2007, the "Founding Five" student members, aimed to make the college experience for people who were the first in their families to attend college, a bit easier to navigate.

Today, Chyrisha is focused on becoming an OB/GYN. She is also a Birth and Postpartum Doula. She was a founding Doula with the Michigan Prison Doula Initiative and helped establish its roots in the women's prison system in the State of Michigan. Her hope is to help reduce maternal mortality rates by counteracting the social determinants that plague marginalized populations.

Chyrisha identifies as a Black, female, wife, mother, and first-generation, non-traditional student. She understands that these combined identities are underrepresented among medical professionals, and she is aiming to help change that narrative.

#### GRADUATION CELEBRATION HISTORY

The University of Michigan's First-Generation College Student @ Michigan student organization held its first graduation in 2009. This celebration was hosted in the living room of Dwight Lang, a sociology professor at the University of Michigan, and his wife, Sylvia. In 2011, the number of students participating in the graduation had grown, and the event was relocated to the Pond Room in the Michigan Union. In 2017, funding was provided through the Vice Provost, Robert Sellers, and the graduation was held in the Michigan Union Ballroom. In the same year, the Office of Academic Multicultural Initiatives, the Comprehensive Studies Program, the Office of New Student Programs, and Multi-Ethnic Student Affairs collaborated in hiring the first program manager for the university's First-Generation initiative and expanded the scope of First-Gen efforts. The graduation celebration continues to be a highlight of the program and comprises one of seven cultural graduations hosted annually by the Office of Academic Multicultural Initiatives.



#### GRADUATION CELEBRATION MISSION

The First-Generation Graduation celebrates the commonalities and differences that characterize the experiences of first-generation and other students at the University of Michigan and serves as an example of the University of Michigan's commitment to diversity.

The ceremony acknowledges the value and uniqueness of the first-generation student experience and serves to commemorate the accomplishments of those students that participate in the celebration. The First-Generation Graduation recognizes faculty and staff who provide academic enrichments, research opportunities, programs, and activities that promote the communal striving and sense of accountability that help students to achieve.

The Office of Academic Multicultural Initiatives, in partnership with the First-Generation Graduation Planning Committee, institutes this annual celebration as an expression and tradition of valuing the University's cultural offerings and commitment to diversity.

### STATEMENT OF FREEDOM OF SPEECH AND ARTISTIC EXPRESSION

The University of Michigan strives to create an open forum in which diverse opinions can be expressed and heard. #### LAND AND LABOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT

The University of Michigan is located on the territory of the Anishinaabeg people. The Ann Arbor campus resides on land ceded through the Treaty of Detroit in 1807. Additionally, in 1817, the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Bodewadami Nations made the largest single land transfer to the University of Michigan, ceded through the Treaty of Fort Meigs, with the agreement that their children would be educated in perpetuity.

We assert the sovereignty of tribal lands and acknowledge the painful historical and ongoing genocide, forced assimilation, and displacement of Native communities in establishing the university.

We affirm contemporary and ancestral Anishinaabeg ties to this land, the profound contributions of Native American peoples to this institution, and the University's commitment to educating the children of Native ancestors.

We further recognize that whether you are on campus in Ann Arbor or elsewhere in the United States, we stand on land developed at the often-fatal expense of forcefully enslaved Black people. We acknowledge that much of this country, including its culture, economic growth, and development has been made possible by the labor of enslaved Africans and their descendants who suffered the horror of the transatlantic trafficking, chattel slavery, and dehumanization through segregation and Jim Crow laws.

We remember those who did not survive the Middle Passage, those who were beaten and lynched, and those who are still suffering while fighting for their freedom. We are indebted to their labor and unwilling sacrifice, and acknowledge the violence throughout the generations and the resulting impact and generational trauma still felt today.

The fights against settler colonialism and anti-blackness will always be inextricably linked. To the land, to the collective, and to the ancestors, we thank you, we thank you, we thank you.
